The term shrimp originated around the 14th century with the Middle English word Shrimpe meaning: to contract or wrinkle and the Old Norse word Skorpna meaning: to shrivel up. WOW both of these things happen when shrimp are cooked. Okay, that takes care of the word shrimp, but what about the word jumbo? More investigating brought us to the origin. In 1883 P.T. Barnum (remember "a sucker born every minute"?) acquired a larger than normal African bush elephant for his famous circus and this was the name he gave to him.
